The trustees (who are also the directors) present their report and the audited financial statements of the charitable company for the year ended 31 March 2012. The statutory information is shown on Page 1.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The company, number 03792760, is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on the 21st June 1999 and registered as a charity on 20th September 1999. The charity registration number is 1077484. It has a Memorandum and Articles of Association as its governing document.

Clinical Services

The clinical services at SurvivorsUK are overseen by the Clinical Services Manager (CSM) Georgina Hoare who has been in post since October 2008.

Business Development

Business Development and Operations are overseen by Business Development Manager (BDM) Michael May who has been in post since Jan 2008.

OBJECTIVE AND ACTIVITIES

Vision

Anyone affected by male sexual violation is appropriately supported.

Mission and Values

SurvivorsUK helps men who have been sexually violated and raises awareness of their needs Note: Sexual violation includes both childhood sexual abuse and adult sexual assault/rape.

SurvivorsUK:

- challenges perceptions those of survivors, those of the public and those of decision makers:
- helps men who have been sexually violated at any point in their lives and also provides support for their families;
- values being transparent in its every day operation and communication;
- believes in nurturing, supporting and motivating our colleagues and clients to develop and grow;
- is non-judgemental we believe and accept people's experiences and the impacts of those experiences

Significant activities

The company is a charity that provides counselling, support, advice and information to men who have suffered sexual assault as well as training and consultancy to agencies/individuals who come into contact with these men.

Public benefit

The trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing their aims and objectives and in planning future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives of the charity.

SERVICES

Counselling Service

We continue to provide a low cost counselling service for adult men over 18 who have experienced sexual violation. We have a team of 9 counsellors (3 male and 6 female) who come from a variety of training backgrounds including; psychodynamic, integrative, TA, existential, person centred. This includes an honorary counsellor position for a qualified trainee in their last year of MSc training at Birkbeck College, University of London. In the 12 months of this report:

- 117 clients offered assessment
- 1600+ hrs of individual counselling delivered
- 28 people assessed for groups (low uptake on group program currently but under review)
- 48 hrs of group therapy delivered

SurvivorsUK uses CORE to monitor the outcomes of our clinical work. Of the 123 total cases opened in 2011/12, 74 were taken into counselling for either long consultation/assessment or other on-going process. Of these, we have complete data from 32 closed cases on which the information below is based.

For the last 3 years running we've continued to have a very low waiting time of on average 12 days from referral to initial assessment which is significantly lower than the national average of 71 days.

Of the clients completing all clinical scoring forms it's useful to note that client's reported a 5% reduction in mild or moderate risk to themselves or others (self- harm, suicidal, harm to others or forensic).

Additionally, the following information was collected from the therapist beginning and ending assessment of clients and reflects the following improvements:

Day to day functioning - 50% clients improvement Coping strategies / techniques - 42% improvement Personal insight/understanding - 58% improvement

Additionally we do use CORE in a number of other areas to look at the quality of therapists work (as reported by clients), the number of planned/unplanned endings, the cost effectiveness of the service (as indicated by number attended/not attended sessions) and clinical improvement. However due to the relatively small number of closed cases per year, we tend to only view and compare this data on a bi-annual basis with national benchmarks.

Helpline Service

The helpline service has often been the first point of contact for many of our clients. This national service is open to male survivors, their partners, carers and friends and can be both a vital resource for emotional support, but also a service to signpost to other services across the UK.

During this period the helpline continued to be staffed with trained volunteers, each undertaking two shifts per month in addition to supervision. 298 calls answered on helpline. There is downward trend in helpline calls in total to the service, but an increase in the number of calls answered proportionally during the helpline hours due to a second line being consistently open. Additionally there has been a concurrent increase in e-mail contact and direct calls to office.

Training

Internal training:

We continue to offer 4 internal training days per year to counsellors and helpliners and the topics over this period were: Countertransference, Ambivalence and Ambiguity, Working with personality disorder and Working creatively.

External training programme

36 professionals have attended 2 day trainings (introductory and therapeutic trainings) based at Holborn with a further 60+ have attended lectures, staff trainings of a minimum one hour each. This training has been provided by either CSM or nominated counsellors who provide training.

FUNDING PROFILE

In the 12 month from 01/04/11 - 31/03/12 the organisation was primarily funded through a combination of statutory and trust contributions. Additional funds come from client fees, donations and community fundraising activities.

Statutory funding comes from The Victims Fund and from the Home Office Special Fund for Male Victims of Sexual and Domestic Violence. Trust funding comes from The Big Lottery, Tudor Trust, The Rayne Foundation, Awards for All.

25th ANNIVERSARY

Fundraising

From May 2011 the charity orchestrated and took part in a number of public facing fundraising and awareness enhancing events to celebrate 25 years of continuous operation. Among these were a Gala Concert, an auction of artwork donated to support the charity, participation in two significant London running events and a number of sponsored activities by individuals. The combined return from these activities was in excess of £20,000.

Real Men Get Raped Advertising Campaign

Supported by funding from Awards for All and the Home Office Male Victims Fund, Survivors UK undertook a provocative London centred advertising poster campaign to raise awareness around male rape and drive traffic through website. The campaign launched in Feb 2012 and ran for 4 weeks on London Underground. The associated PR campaign resulted in significant public exposure for the issue and organisation:

Following the launch on 20th Feb we received significant on-line attention with editorial in the London Evening Standard, Mail on-Line, Pink News, Huffington Post, Advocate, New York Daily News, San Francisco Chronicle, Denver Times, several UK regional papers and much of the London local press. The story resulted in more than 75 trade and blog stories and attracted wide comment. We had a major editorial piece in the Observer (which translated to the Guardian website where it was the 2nd most read piece of the day) and we're highlighted in a 2 page article on male rape in The Times. The poster image was also used in a Financial Times article looking at charity advertising. The story has also been covered internationally in The Irish Times, Le Figaro and in news publications in Denmark, Finland, Sweden, Germany, The Netherlands, Brazil and South Africa.

BDM was interviewed about the campaign and male rape on the Jeremy Vine show on 21/02; on Gaydar Radio on 23/02 and on BBC London drivetime on 23/02.

1a. Basis of accounting

1b. Tangible fixed assets

Fixed assets are shown at historical cost.

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life by the straight line method.

1c. Taxation

The charitable company is exempt from taxation under sections 466 to 493 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010.

1d. Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

1e. Resources expended

Resources expended are allocated to a particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. They include irrecoverable VAT.

Governance costs are the costs of complying with constitutional and statutory requirements and include the costs associated with the strategic management of the charity.

1f. Funds

The Restricted Funds are restricted income funds given to the charity for specific purposes. They are expendable by the trustees in furtherance of particular projects within the charity objects.

The Unrestricted Funds are funds expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity.
