The trustees (who are also the directors) present their report and the audited financial statements of the charitable company for the year ended 31 March 2013. The statutory information is shown on Page 1.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The company, number 03792760, is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on the 21st June 1999 and registered as a charity on 20th September 1999. The charity registration number is 1077484. It has a Memorandum and Articles of Association as its governing document.

VISION, MISSION AND OBJECTIVES

Vision

Anyone affected by male sexual violation is appropriately supported.

Mission and Values

SurvivorsUK helps men who have been sexually violated and raises awareness of their needs *Note: Sexual violation includes both childhood sexual abuse and adult sexual assault/rape.*

SurvivorsUK:

- o challenges perceptions those of survivors, those of the public and those of decision makers;
- o helps men who have been sexually violated at any point in their lives and also provides support for their families;
- o values being transparent in its every day operation and communication;
- o believes in nurturing, supporting and motivating our colleagues and clients to develop and grow;
- o is non-judgemental we believe and accept people's experiences and the impacts of those experiences

OBJECTIVES

SurvivorsUK is in the second year of a 5 year strategic plan with goals that include:

- o Increasing counselling and therapy offering by 100% + over 5 years
- o Utilising technology to provide innovative and far reaching avenues of support for men who have experienced sexual violation
- o Augmenting the emotional support services of the organisation to serve increasing numbers of affected men, their families, friends and carers
- Developing and delivering specialized training to increasing numbers and cohorts of professionals likely to deal with sexually violated men
- o Campaigning and lobbying activities to increase recognition of male sexual assault victims at national and local government levels
- o Advertising and promotion to raise the profile of the issue and organisation at Pan-London and national level, thereby reducing the stigma attached to male sexual violation and encouraging more affected men to come forward for help
- Research to increase the evidence base around male sexual violation and to encourage better inclusion of facts and statistics specific to male victims in all consideration of sexual violence as a whole

Primary activities

SurvivorsUK provides counselling, support, advice and information to men who have suffered sexual assault as well as training and consultancy to agencies/individuals who come into contact with these men. The organisation also campaigns for recognition of and raises awareness of the prevalence and effects of sexual violation of men and boys

Public benefit

The trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing their aims and objectives and in planning future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives of the charity.

SERVICES

Counselling Service

Our low cost counselling service continues to be our primary service, for adult men over 18 who have experienced sexual violation at any time in their lives.

We have a team of 11 counsellors (male and female) providing individual counselling and group therapy.

The counselling team are fully trained psychotherapists and counsellors from a variety of training backgrounds including; psychodynamic, integrative, TA, existential and person centered.

During this year, we were proud to achieve:

- o 141 self-referrals for counselling (individual and group total) all offered assessment with 74% attending.
- o At the start of the financial year we had space to see 30 clients (at any time) for individual counselling. By end of year we had significantly increased capacity to 49 clients.
- We provided 1554 hours of individual counselling (excluding assessments) in comparison to 936 in 2011/12.
- o During this year we increased the maximum offer of individual counselling from 1 to 2 years.
- o Low cost fees continued unchanged since October 2008.
- Demand for group therapy continued to be lower therefore only one 12 week group was delivered.
- o Low waiting times in comparison to national average in CORE of only 17 days average from referral to initial consultation. (This is a slight increase from 12 days for the last 3 years).

We continue to use CORE from the entry into the organisation and clients complete an OM2 every three months during their counselling. CORE is useful to look at a range of clinical issues alongside reviewing the quality of therapists work (as reported by clients), the number of planned/unplanned endings, the cost effectiveness of the service (as indicated by number attended/not attended sessions) and clinical improvement. However due to the relatively small number of closed cases per year, we tend to only view and compare some this data on a bi-annual basis with national benchmarks.

Over this year for the forty closed cases on CORE we have the following information about client functioning.

45% improvement in day to day functioning 59% improved access to practical help 55% improved in subjective well being

All domains - (functioning, problems, risk, well-being) Pre average score: 1.94

Post average score: 1.54

Cut off 1.19

These high scores are indications of the high level of severity/ complex cases we see. Although the average post score is still higher than the cut off there is a significant drop from start overall. Overall average of closed cases well below cut off levels.

Service user feedback on the counselling service:

This year we introduced a new client satisfaction and feedback form, alongside the opportunity for ex-service users to agree to on-going contact with us regarding research, media and organisational development.

75% clients agreed or strongly agreed that they found it straightforward to self-refer for counselling

87.5% clients felt their difficulties were understood by their counsellor/group therapist

100% clients would recommend the counselling service to others

87.5% rate the counselling service as excellent

75% have improved understanding about the impact of the sexual violation they experienced

Emotional support services

Helpline Service

The helpline our longest standing service of twenty-six years has often been the first point of contact for many of our clients. This national service is open to male survivors, their partners, carers and friends and can be both a vital resource for emotional support, but also a service to signpost to other services across the UK.

During this period the helpline continued to be staffed with trained volunteers, each undertaking two shifts per month in addition to supervision. There has been a downward trend in received helpline calls over the last five years, although we saw an increase this year to 1715 calls received and 421 calls answered during helpline hours. Additionally there has been a concurrent increase in e-mail contact and direct calls to office often for signposting and information about our services.

Supportive workshops for friends and family

In February 2013 we launched this new initiative.

We recognise that male sexual violation impacts not only men who have experienced this trauma, but also on those close to them. It is our aim in these one day workshops to provide both information, through a psycho-educational focus and emotional support in order to allow time for supporters (friends, family and partners) to have an opportunity to think about the impact of their close one's sexual violation on them.

In this year we delivered one supportive workshop and depending on demand intend to deliver this minimum three times per year.

Training and Research

Internal training:

We continue to offer up to 4 internal training days per year to counsellors and helpliners and the topics over this period were:

Introduction to Dissociative Identity disorder - facilitated by Valerie Sinason

Working with the couple in mind - facilitated by Annie Power

Working with Difference (2 days) - Alan Corbett

External training programme

In September 2012 we put on our first conference entitled "Male sexual violation through the life cycle - a one day conference exploring the psychological impacts of sexual violence against men and boys".

This was attended by 56 professionals from a variety of backgrounds. Speakers and workshop facilitators included: Zoe Lodrick, Dr Tom McManus, Dr Simon Mullins, Lucy Smith, Richard Unwin and Sarah Van Gogh.

We have continued to provide two structured 2 day trainings, an introductory 2 day training and a therapeutic 2 day. In this period we delivered 2 introductory and 2 advanced trainings to 19 professionals.

In addition to this structured programme SurvivorsUK continues to provide informal trainings and consultations to individuals and teams of minimum one hour each, typically at our base in Holborn.

Research

This last year has been important because we wrote our research strategy and plans for the next five years. Dr Nina Burrowes and Tessa Horvath undertook some pro-bono work and wrote "The rape and sexual assault of men - a review" outlining all the literature on male rape and sexual assault published between 1990 and 2012.

FUNDING PROFILE

In the 12 month from 01/04/12 - 31/03/13 the organisation was primarily funded through a combination of statutory and trust contributions. Additional funds come from client fees, donations and community fundraising activities.

Statutory funding comes from The Victims Fund. Trust funding comes from The Big Lottery, The Rayne Foundation, Awards for All. We are currently in 2nd stage of application with Lloyds TSB and Trust for London.

The organisation came to the end of a 4 year funding relationship with Tudor Trust with a 2 year window before re-application will be entertained. This was the primary funding for the Business Development Manager post which is the subject of application to Trust for London.

Both website and referral traffic have sustained at roughly 100% higher than the year before and we hope to augment this with further advertising and promotional work.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The Board of trustees operates a policy whereby unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets held by the charity should be between 3 and 6 months of resources expended. The current level is set at £49,000.

1a. Basis of accounting

The charitable company is exempt from taxation under sections 466 to 493 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010.

1d. Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Grants are accounted for in the period specified for their use by donors.

Donations and bank interest are accounted for as received.

1e. Resources expended

Resources expended are allocated to a particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. They include irrecoverable VAT.

Governance costs are the costs of complying with constitutional and statutory requirements and include the costs associated with the strategic management of the charity.

1f. Funds

The Restricted Funds are restricted income funds given to the charity for specific purposes. They are expendable by the trustees in furtherance of particular projects within the charity objects.

The Unrestricted Funds are funds expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity.
